# Purdue hitting the road for Maryland 

Unbeaten Terrapins will make for tough conference match

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Back at Big Ten Conference media day in July, Maryland senior offensive lineman Michael Dunn already grasped the importance of today's matchup with Purdue.

Asked what Purdue fans and players should expect on their first visit to Maryland Stadium, Dunn responded like a lone Terrapins are newcomers to the league.
"They should expect a really compet itive team," Dunn said. "It's our homecoming game, so look out for a rowdy alumni will come back."
