Central Catholic wins semistate in dramatic finish

CROWN POINT — Three days after the death of beloved Central Catholic girls assistant basketball coach Jeff Dienhart, his words still resonated.

Keep going. Keep fighting. Keep battling.

Down eight with 50.7 seconds left, the message printed on the back of the Knights' shooting shirts played out on the basketball court at Crown Point High School.

Junior captain posts straight double-doubles

Purdue had piled up a season high for points, maintained its second-place standing in the Big Ten Conerence and moved one win closer to an NCA ment berth. But The Boilermakers' junior captain couldn't comprehend the lack of focus that allowed Rutgers to cut a one-time 20-point Purdue lead to six in the final minute.

Tenth straight loss deposits Boilermakers in basement

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The reset button has already been used by Sharon Verysp.

The ninth-year coach of the Purdue women's basketball team probably did it a long time ago, but the end of the regular season makes it official.

"Do we like what we did this season? No. Could we control everything? No. Could we control other things? Yes," Versyp said following Saturday's 61-56 loss to Michigan State at Mackey Arena. "You don't have a choice. Anything can happen."

For the second time in program history and the first time in 31 years, the Boilermakers finished last in the Big Ten standings. Purdue ends the regular season on a 10-game losing streak and the only thing left is next week's conference tournament in Hoffman Estates, Ill.

'You go into the tournament and trust and believe that we can go in and win this thing. I fully do," said senior Whitney Bays, who totaled 17 points and 10 rebounds.

It's a monumental task to win five games in five days for a team which hasn't been effective shooting from the perimeter, recently endured turnover and rebounding problems and struggled with execution in late-game situations. "We have to go out there and battle,"

senior Liza Clemons said.

Versyp will point to what transpired in 2008 when the Boilermakers needed to win three games in three days to earn the automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. They beat Indiana, Iowa and Illinois that year.

The difference? Purdue was the No. 3 seed seven years ago but start this year's tournament as the No. 14 seed.

"Is it a hard task? Absolutely. Everybody has to be fresh and giving great energy all the time," Versyp said

For stretches Saturday, that's what the Boilermakers did. They took a page out of Illinois' defensive playbook and trapped the Spartans out of their zone defense, helping force 20 turnovers.

"It had a big impact," said Clemons, who had 11 points. "We got after it. It was

big."
However, for every turnover Purdue forced, it gave one back. The Boilermakers committed 21, leading to 26 points for Michigan State.

Dias wins Big Ten title; divers help Boilermaker swimmers finish fourth

Senior Lyam Dias captured the 200-meter breaststroke title in the final race of his Purdue career Saturday night at the Big Ten Men's Swimming and Diving Championships hosted by

Diam set a pool record with his winning time of 1:53.92, Purdue's first swimming Big Ten title since 2009. Teammate Marat Amaltdinov was third in 1:54.33, breaking his own Purdue freshman record.

That duo and Purdue's diving squad led the Boilermakers to a fourth-place team finish with 401.5 points, 19.5 more than Wisconsin. The result matches Purdue's best finish, most recently accomplished in 2010. Michigan dominated the championships with 760 points for its fifth consecutive ti-

Steele Johnson's third runner-up finish of the championships led five Boilermakers in the top 10 of men's platform diving. Johnson's 510.20 trailed points only James Conner of Indiana, who scored 532.45.

Purdue's Nathan Cox was third with 463.35. Add in Jamie Bissett's fifth-place finish, Sean Mokhtari's eighth-place effort and the 10th-place finish of Alec Back, and Boilermakers earned 65 points to vault into fourth place.

Boilermaker Aquatic Center is up next in the rotation to host the Big Ten Championships and will host the conference meet the final weekend of February 2016.

Purdue 6-4 Saturday morning on the final day of the Phoenix Muni Classic.

Behind seven shutout innings from Matt Frawley, the Boilermakers (4-7) carried a 4-0 lead into the bottom of the ninth. But Purdue did not record the first out of the inning until CSUB (6-6) had already tied the game thanks to five consecutive hits.

Alex Lyons (0-1) retired both batters he faced in the ninth inning after entering the game with the go-ahead run on third base and no outs. Following a pop fly to short left field, the inning came to an end on a strike-'em-out, tag-'emout double play when CSUB inexplicably tried to execute a suicide squeeze bunt with one out and an 0-2 count on the hitter. Two batters earlier, Ryan Grotjohn tied the game with a tworun triple to left center.

But Lyons was unable to record the third out of the 11th inning. Jeff Evak made a diving effort to catch a sinking humpback line drive off the bat of Grotjohn, but was unable to come up with it. Kris Cayton followed with an RBI double to right center. A pinch hit RBI single for Soloman Williams followed.

Frawley surrendered only three singles and one walk over seven innings. He retired 15 of 16 batters from the second through seventh innings.

McCutcheon graduate Cody Strong delivered a two-out, two-run single in the seventh inning to extend Purdue's lead to 4-0 and chase CSUB starter Nick Rogowski, who struck out eight over 6\(\frac{1}{3} \) innings. Rogowski retired nine batters in a row after the Boilers took a 1-0 lead in the fourth inning on a squeeze bunt by Brett Carlson.

Strong doubles play, combined with dominating singles lifted the 21st-ranked Boilermakers to a 5-2 Big Ten victory at Iowa.

For the fourth time this season, the Boilermakers (5-2, 1-0 Big Ten) claimed the doubles point with victories at Nos. 1 and 2. Lynda Xepoleas and Natalia Davila struck first, cruising past Hawkeye duo Morven McCulloch and Zoe Douglas 8-2. Tess Bernard-Feigenbaum and Daniela Vidal used an 8-4 decision over Shelby Talcott and Anastasia Reimchen to claim their ninth

Three consecutive singles victories came in dominating fashion from Krisztina Kapitany and Vidal, with the clinch coming at No. 3 courtesy of Xepoleas. Kapitany (5-2) rolled past Douglas at No. 6, 6-1, 6-2, followed by a 6-0, 6-3 showing from Vidal against Talcott at No. 1. Xepoleas posted a 6-4, 6-3 victory over Reimchen for her seventh win of the spring season.

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NCAA tournament appearances. That second goal remains in reach, but only if Purdue doesn't stumble in its final three regular season

Besides colorful language, Davis is finding new ways to push the Boilermakers back to success. He posted his second straight double-double in Thursday's victory and is averaging 11.5 points, 8.5 rebounds and 4.3 assists during Purdue's four-game winning streak.

"You can tell that he's hungry," senior guard Jon Octeus said. "He's experienced a rough couple of years in his college career. We have an opportunity to experience something special, and he's ready for that. He's hooked up.

Prior to the winning streak, Davis had just double-digit reone bounding performance all season. He grabbed nine against Nebraska on Feb. 15 and followed that with 10 against both Indiana and Rutgers. A quarter of his rebounds in that stretch came on offense.

Davis credited the increased boards presence to "just playing hard — doing whatever it took for my team to get more possessions, get more chances and take away chances for second-shot opportunities for other teams.

Purdue coach Matt Painter recently called Davis "one of the best defenders we've had here in the past 10 years." Davis initially balked at what he called a "bold" statement, but appreciated the confidence Painter has invested in him.

That should continue down the stretch, beginning with Sunday's game at Ohio State. Davis was a big reason why Buckeyes star freshman guard D'Angelo Russell had to work so hard for his 20 points in Purdue's 60-58 victory at Mackey Arena on Feb. 4.

Davis said he loves those challenging defensive assignments. They fit his ultra-competitive nature.

So do the handful of fiery halftime or postgame locker room talks he's delivered this season. He understands that, due to his tenure and captaincy, the Boilermakers listen when he speaks.

"Sometimes I'm more cutthroat than I should be," Davis said. "At the time, I felt like everybody needed to know how I felt. I felt like we should have done a lot better. It wasn't a good game to watch. It wasn't a good game to play in towards the end. We should have been better than that and I just wanted everybody to know."

Onken finished with 17 points and nine rebounds, Burks scored 15 to go with seven boards and Angela Tharp provided eight points. Those three combined to go 12-for-51, but it was enough.

With Bobcats junior Alexandria Minix fouled out, CC thought it could exploit having a more experienced lineup. Oregon-Davis turned the ball over eight times in the Minix and 6-foot-2 center Alexandria Bope, who also was saddled with foul trouble, Taylor Kranenburg did her best to carry her squad.

The junior guard scored 28 points. Oregon-Davis couldn't overcome its 30 turnovers.

"The youth of us came out," Bobcats coach Terry Minix said. "We didn't have our regular point guard in there and everybody else that doesn't really handle the ball was in there and had to handle the ball. It put a little more pressure on these kids and that is something they haven't through."

Jenny Harkcom's four steals led a stingy Central Catholic defense. Harkcom also was 2-for-3 shooting, the only player who shot better than 33.3 percent for her team.

The Knights trailed most of the afternoon due to poor shooting. Once shots started falling, CC was in perfect position to punch its ticket to Indianapolis.
